Who are undocumented students?

- Students who are not US citizens, permanent residents or visa holders
- Most grew up in the US and do not know any other country
- Can attend college in most states
- Most are first-generation students from working class families
- Most are prevented from going to college because of high cost and limited aid

Undocumented Students at Mason

- Majority commute from home, long hours, on public transportation
- Many don't eat regularly
- Work in cash economy
- Many experience financial problems while in school
- Must support family
- Take leaves to save up money for school
- Many internalize stress due to pressure, lack of understanding both at home and school

Challenges at Mason

- 1. Undocumented students cannot afford out-of-state cost,
 many who pay taxes and contribute to the Virginia economy
- 2. Vague and/or inconsistent communication, policies and procedures
- 3. Lack of resources that cater to the needs of undocumented students

Terms you should know

- The D.R.E.A.M Act
- The Development, Relief and Education for Alien Minors Act is also known as the DREAM Act. This act is a proposed legislation that allows qualified high school students who are undocumented, and wish to serve in the Army or receive a higher education by going to college, may gain legal status in the United States.

ACTIVITY

Undocumented

Describes individuals who are in the US with no legal status.
 They either entered the US without a visa or legal documentation or they violated the terms of his or her status and remained in the US without authorization.

DACA

- On June 15, 2012, Executive Order
- Certain people who came to the United States as children and meet several key guidelines may request consideration of deferred action
- Two years, subject to renewal, and would then be eligible for work authorization.
- NOT a path toward citizenship, nor a green card, nor is it the DREAM Act.

HB88

- Attended a public or private high school in VA
- Has resided in the Commonwealth for at least three years since the date he/she graduated high school
- Parents paid taxes at least three years
- DACA recipient

Existing Models


 Let's take a look at universities that have existing models that foster the success of undocumented students

- Undocumented Student Program
- A variety of workshops centered around undocumented student experiences, such as legal rights, career development, post undergraduate options, financial aid, and mental wellness
- Counselor and staff in-service training for campus departments to ensure campus personnel are informed of federal and state policies that impact undocumented students


- "BRC works closely with several programs across campus whose staff members understand the special needs and concerns of undocumented students."
